## Head teacher's report

It has certainly been another busy term and this edition of Onwards bears testament to the vast range of activities and events the students and staff have once again been involved in. The students are as ever enthusiastic, talented and generous with their time. However they need the support of teachers in everything that they do and I would like to thank the staff for their efforts which again go far beyond the call of duty!! None of these out of hours activities could take place without the hard work and dedication of our teachers. Thank you!! (Mrs Stratton)

## Student and parent voice

Thank you for your continued contributions to our parent questionnaires. The results are very useful and help us with our decisions about how the school develops. As ever the response to homework is rather split. 54% of respondents feel that there is not enough homework and 42% feel there is too much. There is a clear consensus about the choice of healthy food on offer in the canteen with 64% of respondents feeling that the canteen offers a wide choice of healthy food. Many parents feel that they do not know about the canteen with children presumably taking packed lunches to school. Numbers of students and staff using the canteen this year have increased dramatically and the quality of food on offer has created interest across the community, many of you may have heard discussions on Spire FM earlier this term. We have subsequently invited the presenters for lunch and await their reply! We are planning to refurbish the kitchen and dining room areas this summer.

More controversial was the suggestion that we send all correspondence to parents via e mail with 65% of respondents agreeing and 31% not. We will continue to send parents paper copies but will also send e mailed versions. (Mr Blundell)

It has been a real privilege to sit down with parents at Parents' Evening to discuss some of the issues which have been an ongoing focus for the school eg uniform issues and the canteen. Also to talk through some of the more personal issues that they have concerning school, such as their daughter's progress or well-being. Some of the ideas raised have been very helpful in informing school policy and we hope that parents will continue to feel that they have several avenues of access to the school. (Mr Owen)

## Disability equality scheme

The government has recently requested that all schools establish a working group to monitor the schools response to disability. The working group should consist of parents, students and staff. I would like to ask if any parents would consider making a contribution to this discussion. The government's definition of disability is rather broader than we might imagine and reads as follows:

" A person is disabled if they have a mental or physical impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day to day activities".

It is important that the school responds to the needs of parents students and staff to ensure that we have done all that is practicable to support them with their disability and their access to the school's services. The working group may include disabled people but also those who have an interest in disability equality. Please contact Mr Blundell is you are interested in working with these groups (Mr Blundell)

It has been a busy month for citizenship projects at South Wilts. On March 6<sup>th</sup> a group of Year 8 and 9 students took part in a Youth Training session at the Arts Centre, designed to develop their ideas about what it means to represent the views of others and to have the opportunity to discuss what young people think about different issues. The favourite activity was probably the one which involved voting with chocolate bars, and then eating them of course!


On March 10<sup>th</sup> months of preparation was finally tested when a group of twelve Year 8 and 9 students plus two sixth form helpers met at the Magistrates' Court in Southampton to take part in the local heat of the Citizenship Foundation Mock Trial Competition. Preparations for the day included two visits into school from a local magistrate and a visit to the courts to see some trials in action, plus a detailed study of the case we had to present on the day. The case featured an accusation of cruelty to animals, which we had to prosecute against the Vyne School from Basingstoke, and then defend against Cranbourne Business and Enterprise College, also from Basingstoke.

The entire team were absolutely marvellous on the day and coped with the daunting prospect of speaking as the only voice in a silent courtroom with real confidence. It is our first time taking part in this event and we lost to a school with much more experience. The whole team were congratulated for their performance and the judges made special mention of the exceptional performance of the first prosecution lawyer in her cross-examination of the defence witness, and of the clear and reasoned discussions of the three magistrates as they debated the verdicts with representatives from the other school.

Everyone received a certificate, presented by the High Sheriff of Hampshire, and enjoyed the hospitality of lunch provided for participants and their parents. We hope to take part again and perhaps extend our participation to competitions for older pupils as well. (Mrs Stammers - PSD Coordinator)

### Battlefields Trip

This was a great adventure for all concerned, whether following in the footsteps of the 87<sup>th</sup> Division on the Somme or splashing through the trenches and tunnels of Sanctuary Wood near Ypres. It was a time for reflection - particularly at Tyne Cot cemetery where so many thousands of young British and Commonwealth soldiers are buried. On this trip we were able to find the grave of a relative of one of our Year 10 students, providing a personal connection with the events of the Great War. But the Battlefields' Expedition has always offered a range of experiences – and these included a visit to the Medieval heart of Bruges as well as frequent opportunities to taste the delights of Belgian chocolate. 22nd-30th March**

Late on Thursday 22nd March, 70 French visitors arrived for the return half of our French Exchange involving Year 10s and 12s from both Bishop's and South Wilts. Both year groups had an extensive programme of varied activities, some based in school, some in Salisbury itself and some of the days were spent in London, Bath and Portsmouth. As it is the 10th Anniversary of the exchange we were pleased to welcome the head of Le Loquidy, Monsieur Rousset and one of his deputies, M Dauby for a brief visit at the start of the week. They followed the French students as they took part in a visit to the Cathedral, some workshops, a visit to the fire station and a talk on British schools. There was then a reception at Bishops to mark the anniversary year. Once again, the exchange has been enjoyed by all who have taken part. Many thanks to all who have helped out. (Mrs Jouahri)

**Internet Safety**

Along with other secondary schools in the area, we have taken the decision to block access to all "social-networking" websites from school computers. Such sites include Bebo, Myspace and Facebook. We have done this for a number of reasons but primarily because of increased concerns about internet grooming of young people, and because of the huge growth in "cyber-bullying". All of the social networking sites have recently come under scrutiny by child protection organisations, and all have real weaknesses that haven't been fully addressed. We are bringing this to the attention of parents because of the concerns expressed by child support charities, the police and other bodies over the nature of the content that many young people post on to their entries on such sites. Many young people have themselves contacted antibullying charities because of their feelings of powerlessness and anxiety over derogatory material that has been posted about them. We would urge all parents to monitor the internet use of their children. Consider the long-term safety of your child if you permit unsupervised access to the internet. (Mr Parks)

### Art trip to Holland

### Joint History and German Berlin Trip

Over the half-term holiday (20<sup>th</sup>-23<sup>rd</sup> February) a group of 17 sixth form students from SWGS and BWS visited Berlin. We started our visit with an evening at Potsdamer Platz, the redeveloped heart of the city and marvelled at the beautiful architecture of the Sony Centre. The next morning we went to the "Reichstag", the German parliament buildings and walked up the glass dome designed by Sir Norman Foster to enjoy wonderful views over the city. We also visited the Holocaust Memorial, the Jewish Museum and Checkpoint Charlie museum to discover more about the history of the Jews in the Nazi period and some of the unusual methods used by people to escape over the Berlin Wall between 1961 and 1989. On the next day we visited Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp, which was the forerunner and model for many other camps throughout German-controlled territories. Students were able to listen to individual audio guides which enabled them to reflect on this experience. Our East German bus driver then gave us an excellent tour around the main sights of the former East German capital before taking us to the Ku'damm, the Oxford Street of Berlin, for some well-earned free time. On the final day we had a very memorable visit to the Memorial of German Resistance before ascending the TV tower in Alexanderplatz, the showpiece of the former Communist regime. During the evenings we sampled some of the multicultural food available in this exciting city. All in all it was a really memorable trip and an enjoyable experience. (Mrs Tallis)
